

THEY'RE INFURIATINGLY RESPECTABLE, BUT WE LOVE'EM ANYHOW!

Claude was born in 1938 in Fairfield to Claude and Mae Ballard. Some of his earliest memories are of a loving home, cold winters, deep snow, beautiful summers, and concern caused by the rationing of food, gasoline and many other necessities because of World War II. Since he had the same name as his father, he was called Claudie.

He grew up in Camas County where he attended schools, graduating from Camas County High School in 1956. During the summers from the time he was in the eighth grade he spend the summer working on his Grandmother Gaskill's farm located on the east end of the Prairie. There he learned the value and pride of hard work with his uncle Charlie, driving the model B John Deere, mowing and stacking loose hay, working the land with the D4 Caterpillar tractor and driving the combine during harvest.

In the fall of 1956 Claude joined the Air National Guard and went to basic training at Lackland Air Force Base in San Antonio, Texas. Upon returning home he worked for Camas County Road and Bridge. Later he worked on the planer at the Fairfield sawmill.

In 1959 Claude enrolled at Magic Valley Christian College Majoring in Biology. While there he met a very attractive girl, June Striman from Texas, who

had beautiful blue eyes and a soft southern drawl. After much effort and persuasion on Claude's part they were married in December of 1961. They graduated from college in 1963 with teaching degrees – Claude's in Biology, and June's in English.

June was born in San Angelo, Texas to Mack and Martha Striman. Her father was a minister so her family moved several times during her childhood. She attended several schools in Texas and Oklahoma, graduating from high school

in Killeen, Texas. She then enrolled in Abilene Christian University in Abilene, Texas.

When her family moved to the mission field in La Grande, Oregon, June transferred to Magic Valley Christian College to be closer to them. She graduated *magna cum laude* from Magic Valley

Christian with a major in English and a minor in Education.

Since both Claude and June had teaching certification they started their teaching careers in Shoshone, Idaho. They taught school there for three years, Claude teaching Junior High science and June High School English.

During the summers they attended Abilene Christian University in Abilene, Texas, enrolling in the Master of Education program. Their son Lance was born in March of 1966 and the whole

family was in Abilene when Claude received his Master's Degree.

In 1966 Claude and June moved to Blaine County. Claude taught Junior High Science to eighth graders, and he and June had two daughters – Patricia in 1967 and Tracy in 1970.

In 1968 Claude was promoted to the position of principal at Bellevue Elementary School in Bellevue, Idaho, where he remained for 31 years. During that time the school grew from an enrollment of 150 students to 570, with grades Kindergarten through third, and a staff of 40 by the time he retired in 1997.

In 1965 Claude and June purchased 20 acres on Cherry Creek and started construction on a cabin. The spent two summers living in a tent trailer with their son and two daughters who helped work on the cabin. Great memories were made!

In the Car! In the early 80s Claude began restoring classic cars. Since then, he has restored three World War II jeeps, two 1967 Mustangs, two MGs, one Morris Minor, a 1955 Ford, two 1957 Thunderbirds (one which he and June own that is an extremely rare factory supercharged model of which only 209 were manufactured) and a 1951 Ford Victoria (The Car) similar to the one he had when he graduated from high school, took to college, met June, and then took on their honeymoon!

Also in the 80s Claude was elected mayor of the city of Bellevue for six years, being elected annually as required by city charter. During that time a bond was passed to establish the city's first sewer system and a full-time Marshal position was created.

Since returning to Fairfield, Claude has been elected to the Camas County School Board and served as Chairman since 2005. He and June volunteer at the information Center Caboose.

June is the county's representative on the Area IV Senior Citizens Office of Aging and also volunteers at the Senior Center.

In the past Claude has served on the Senior Citizen Board and also as Chairman of the Board.

Claude and June are very humbled and appreciative of the honor bestowed upon them by the Camas County Fair Board committee. Fairfield in Camas County is truly a great place to call home.

CAMAS SCHOOL DAYS!

OP-ED BY VIC WEBER!

“THOUGHTS ON THE DRAFT RE-ENTRY PLAN!”

“Despite incredible advances in digital learning, you can never replace the value and impact of in-person interaction with a professional, dedicated teacher.”

Governor Little, “Idaho Back to School Framework 2020”

We are in some serious times. The COVID-19 threat is a bit like trying to land a jet on an aircraft carrier during a zero visibility sand storm in the Persian Gulf. You find that you have never been in this situation before. What was routine admin is now suddenly getting your full and complete attention. But with all the distractions that a runaway virus threat provides, we must not lose sight of our primary mission with respect to our children’s education in terms of content and quality.

I have applied this primary mission standard in an evaluation of the draft “Camas County School District #121 2020-2021 School Re-entry Plans” prepared by the outgoing superintendent. The document contains a lot of necessary admin – COVID-19 cleaning and high-five reduction/social interaction minimization measures – that my eyes scanned fairly quickly in search of the measures that more directly affect the mission of learning. And that is the focus of this Op/Ed. I am certain there are a lot of admin items in this plan that will not survive first contact with the enemy and also warrant further scrutiny – we are all in a bit of a zero-visibility sand storm with the virus threat.

What is the Re-Entry Plan Document About?

I must admit, on my first reading of the draft, it was not clear that this was just about COVID-19. The title is a bit ambiguous – perhaps “School District 121 COVID-19 Response Plan” would have clarified it for me. So I emailed the outgoing superintendent and asked him if the document was solely about COVID-19. He wrote that it was indeed only about COVID-19. He also wrote that the plan was not based on current numbers of COVID cases (essentially none now) but on a potential uptick in local cases from zero to substantial. This is in alignment with the Idaho State Department of Education (SDE) document “Idaho Back to School Framework 2020.” So far so good.

State Recommendations

SDE’s Framework 2020 – that’s the state document, remember – has three categories referenced to relative community virus spread ranging from Category 1 which is no virus spread, Category 2 which is minimal to moderate spread, to Category 3 which is substantial community transmission.

The corresponding learning model and response recommendations vary on a scale from traditional in-school learning, to hybrid blended approaches with limited to staggered building use, to complete remote learning and total school shutdown. The Camas draft plan’s A, B, and C categories, at first, appear to align with the state recommendations.

Problems with Our Plans

My primary issue with the Camas plans is the position where we are starting. Closer scrutiny shows that Plan A is already starting with a degraded learning mode with a reduced weekly in-class schedule. However, during the beginning of a Category 2 situation described by SDE (minimal to moderate spread), state recommendations call for traditional learning with school buildings open. The state recommends a hybrid blended approach only when cases have started to significantly increase. *We are choosing to start from a position of essentially zero cases with a plan that has already degraded our children’s in-class learning opportunity.*

The original Camas Plan A called for a full day of remote learning on Fridays. Our incredible teaching staff was able to vote this upward to the current draft plan of half day Fridays.

I would imagine that had the teachers been given an option for five full days of in-class learning as a starting point for Plan A, they would have selected that.

But even at the current Plan A level (4.5 days), the amount of in-class learning time has been reduced by 10 percent for no apparent reason. That’s right - no reason for any of the Plan A reduced in-class learning schedule is given anywhere in the document. No reasons are given as to how this apparently unnecessary drop in class time is better for learning. (No mention of the dearth of daycares with online computer workstations in our community, either.)

What About Plan B?

Plan B is presented as a response to a future further increases in cases, but still in state Category 2 numbers. The plan splits the students into two groups (1 and 2), each group going to class every other day Monday through Thursdays, while doing remote learning on the off days including Fridays. This represents a 60 percent reduction for in-class instruction. At the very least, groups should receive instruction on alternating Fridays yielding an additional 10 percent class time.

Why is the Administration Choosing this Path?

It seems clear that from these plans, the outgoing administration desires remote learning outside of school on Fridays regardless of the number of local infections. A four-day class-time week has been cast, in the draft Camas plan, as the “new normal” for Camas County Schools. COVID-19 appears to be a “Trojan horse” for this “new normal.”

I would expect the outgoing administration is going to say we need that time for cleaning the building and planning remote learning and dealing with some students whose parents are choosing to keep them home. If so, then state the how and why of this in the document and see if it holds up to scrutiny!

One huge hole in the draft document is the question of how are we going to handle the situation of a few stay-at-home students. What are the numbers that justify the enormous effort to teach both kids in class and at home? How will this remote learning be done at the same time as in-class teaching? What level of quality does a single stay-at-home student get? How does a remote learning student count as a seat for funding purposes? I have found no numbers, tripwires, percentages that answer these concerns and questions in the Camas draft re-entry plan document.

Does this Match Our Vision? What Should We Do?

Unfortunately, as a community, we have not yet created a vision to reflect this plan against. In my opinion, a four-day in class learning week would not match any part of our community vision for our school. My recommendation is that we all respond to the community survey requesting modification of Plan A back to a full/traditional five-day in-class

learning week. Plan B should be modified at the very least to include a three-day/two-day rotation for groups 1 and 2, with group students taking turns in class on alternating Fridays. Furthermore, the school needs to reach out to the community and seek solutions for better social distancing options than the two class days per week provided by Plan B. It may be possible to find/create enough large class meeting rooms that provide adequate social distancing. I strongly suspect that many of the K-5 classes could be socially distanced and go to class in person for five full days even in a moderate Category 2 infection situation if we used some of our community resources. The school and the school board must reach out to the community for help. Who is on the committee that is drafting this plan?

Do the Survey!

In any case, we all need to respond to the school’s survey, copy our responses to our board representatives and each have a discussion with them before the August 10 school board meeting. Please respond to the survey by August 3 or you risk not getting your best ideas into the final draft that comes out on August 4. Keep in mind that the proponents of this plan are the outgoing administration. Our former superintendent will not be staying and executing this thing.

We all live in a fantastic jewel, the Camas Prairie, filled with all kinds of talent and treasure. We need to give some of our time, talent and treasure to help our kids through this storm. ■

I would like to direct your attention to your emails and to our website. You have received a parent statement survey that will help us determine your intentions when it comes to enrolling your child or children into Camas County Schools in August. It is essential that as many parents answer the survey as possible. This information will help us with regards to the options we may be able to offer to try to accommodate your child’s educational needs in a COVID-19

environment. Thank you for taking the time to respond.

This will assist CCSD to know your priorities and preference as we look to reopen our schools and plan to accommodate the needs we are able to accommodate. When you register for school, you will be asked if you would like option 1, option 2, or the face-to-face model that the board approves. The question really revolves around requiring masks or not for that option. We realize that whether you choose the third option below or one of the first two may depend on what the district decides to do with masks. As of right now, they are options but we need to hear from the parents about this.

Thank you for answering this important survey. These results along with all parent comments will be considered in a District Leadership Team meeting on Monday, August 3. The final plan recommended to the board will be published as soon as possible. The board will be asked to

approve the plan at the regularly scheduled board meeting on Monday, August 10.

Please remember that if you would like to address the board, you need to contact Wendy Strickler to request to be a scheduled delegate, no later than the close of business on Monday, August 3.

It is likely that we will be educating students from home while we are teaching face-to-face. In order to do that effectively, the teachers will need targeted training and dedicated time to plan and prepare.

This is the only reason why Plan A has a 1/2 day face-to-face and 1/2 day virtual learning Friday. The original plan was to do a full day, but we listened to the parents and staff and changed it to what it currently is. ■
