

Fire vs. Fire! Stewart Creek Fire battle makes big smoke!

Forging a ring of fire in the Iron Mountain flank and the Lime Creek headwaters!

You're Fired! Wednesday marked a big day in active fire control – meaning big flame and big smoke -- on the 4,000+ acre Stewart Creek fire, according to the Inciweb website. On-the-ground firefighters and their aerial accomplices 381 souls in total -- are working to pen the fire in with a “black line” of burned-out fuel areas to confine and steer the blaze to its ultimate conclusion against the high barrier of the Soldier Mountain ridge running east from Iron

Mountain. The fire was sparked on August 20 by lightning near the west end of the Soldier Mountain massif. According to Inciweb, “The fire is burning in standing timber, heavy down and dead understory with visible single tree and group torching.” The Eastern Area Incident Management Team took command of the fire on August 31. Containment is expected a week from Saturday! 🍁

The Fire Story from Inciweb!

YESTERDAY: "Resources took advantage of the favorable weather conditions across the fire area. In the east, ground crews continued firing operations along the dozer line pushing south of the 630 Trail, while utilizing helicopters to "pretreat" the unburned side of the line to minimize spotting potential. The western part of the fire continued slow and steady ignitions, building depth in their lines. Where the burning occurred, good fuel consumption aided in creating a good 'black line,' filling in unburned sections within the containment lines. As a result, the fire size grew by nearly 1,000 acres. The northwest portion of the fire remained in a monitor status. In the north, the fire continued to advance towards the Soldier Mountains, where it is running into natural barriers, minimizing fire spread."

TODAY: "Weather conditions will be similar to yesterday with south winds but warmer temperatures and increased cloud cover which is expected to moderate fire behavior. In the east where the Bremner Creek Trail crosses the containment lines and on the western portions of the fire, ground and air resources will continue coordinated firing operations, with the goal of tying in together at the south fork of Lime Creek. As a result, expect to see another day of increased smoke and aviation today. The northwest portion of the fire will remain in a monitor status with minimal resources. In the north, aircraft will continue to be used to slow the fire while still allowing it to advance towards the Soldier Mountains, where it will run into natural barriers." 🍷
